From the Superintendent ...

At the February Minster Board of Education meeting, the Board accepted the following retirement resignations: Ann Berning, Gerry Conover, Ann Ernst, Mary Lou Koesters, Becky Roetgerman and Sue Westerheide. We want to thank these individuals for the many years that they have dedicated to the children and the school district. We wish you well in your retirement.

I have recently learned from a national newscast about a new phenomenon on the Internet that parents and grandparents need to be aware of, as it is very dangerous. It is called Chat Roulette. Chat Roulette is the most extreme social network and can be very damaging. In order to participate it takes a web cam, which can either be attached to the top of your existing monitor or the newer computers have them already built in. Chat Roulette is a live chat room with live pictures of the person with whom you are talking. When a person is tired of talking to one person they press a key and another person can be seen. The problem is that there are extreme kids who want to show off their body parts or engage in lewd behavior on camera and child predators who physically do things in front of the camera, etc.

A physiologist and a U.S. governmental employee were being interviewed about this new site on the national news broadcast. The physiologist talked of how damaging and dangerous the site is. She said it is critically important to inform parents so that if there is a computer in a teen's bedroom with a web cam, the web cam should be removed. If the web cam is built into the computer, parents need to go into the browser and block the site.

The site was developed by teens and the first week it was up there were 2,000 hits. There are now tens of thousands from all over the world. The federal government is involved because of drug and sex trafficking.

Minster Local School District has blocked all social network sites. Students do not have access to Face Book, Twitter, U-Tube and certainly not Chat Roulette. Our goal is to keep parents/grandparents informed so that you can monitor and talk to your sons and daughters when they use computers at home.

FROM THE TREASURER

The following graph shows current 5 Year Forecast for years 2010 through 2014 for Minster Local Schools. The graph reflects decreasing revenues going forward while future expenditures increase. The main sources of revenue are summarized:

FEDERAL STIMULUS DOLLARS

For fiscal years 2010 and 2011, we are receiving federal stimulus dollars to ensure the same state funding that we received in fiscal year 2009--\$144,000. However, beyond that, there is no guarantee of state funding levels.

INCOME TAX

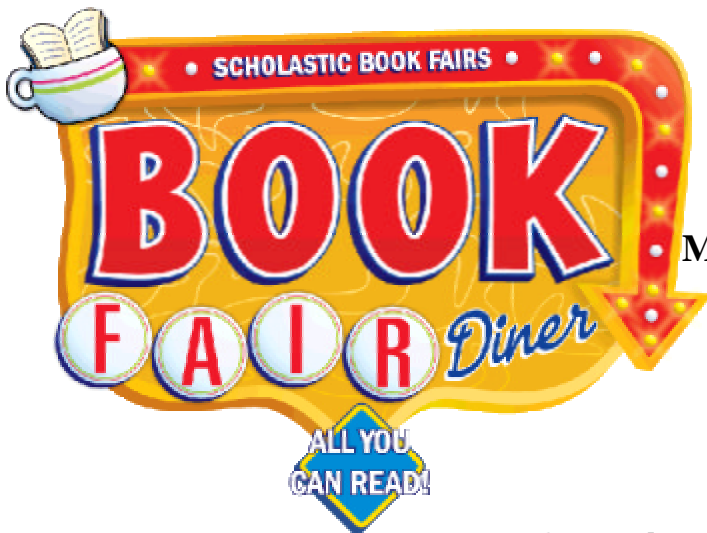
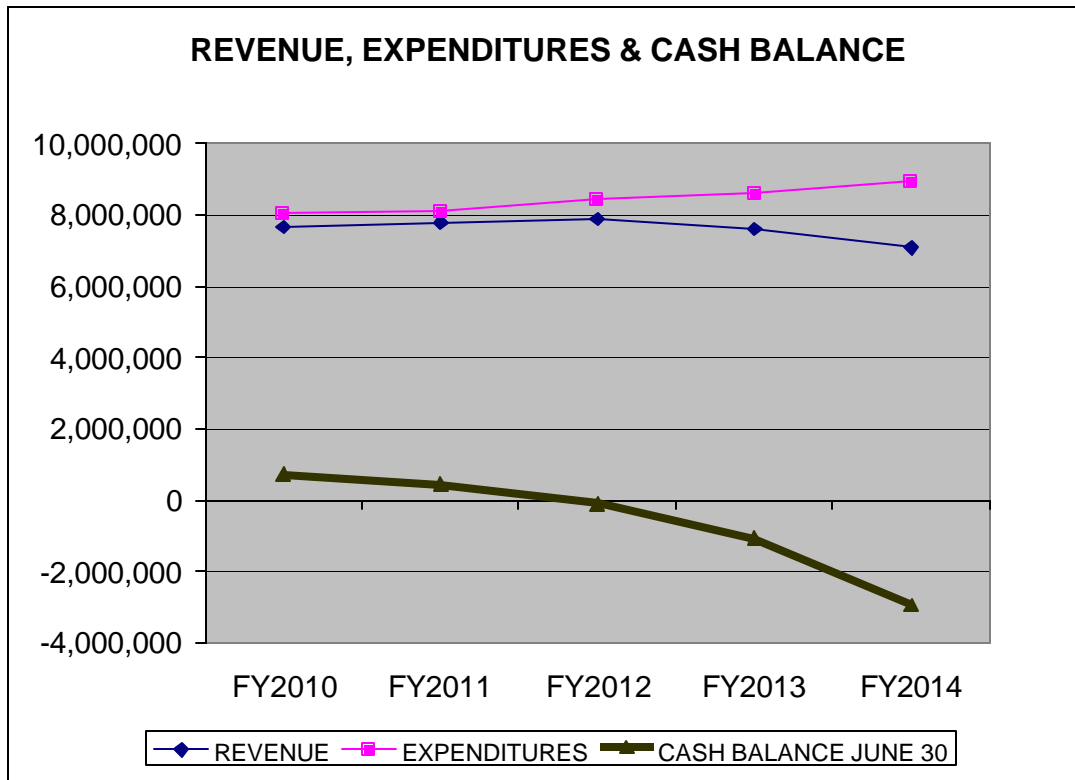
With the current economic climate, the income tax revenue is projected to collect 24% less in fiscal year 2010 than in fiscal year 2009 based on the first 3 quarterly collections. The final year of the income tax levy at .5% is 2011 with final collections occurring in fiscal year 2012.

PERSONAL TANGIBLE TAX

Personal tangible tax (tax on machinery, equipment and inventory for businesses) has been eliminated except on public utilities. The replacement of the personal tangible tax by the state will begin phasing out in fiscal year 2014.

Minster holds Public Speaking Contest

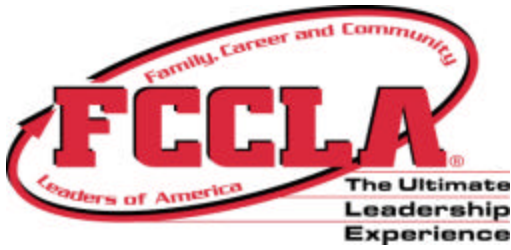

Participants are graded on their cover letter, application, resume, personal interview, and follow up letter.

Allison Bruns and Graham Goebel presented “DRAW the LINE” to the 7th grade, Monday, February 22, in the middle school large group room.

Draw the Line is a presentation based on our concerns of labeling, prejudging and bullying in our school system. Our presentation included statistics of labeling being done to students as well as percentages of students who had admitted to bullying others. Through figures and numbers, skits and a hands-on activity the students were able to realize that even the little

words said to others can make a huge impact. First we caught the attention of the seventh graders. The FCCLA Chapter and the Life Planning and Transitions classes used a catchy introduction movie with clips from modern films including labeling, stereotyping and bullying. After we caught their attention, we hit them with the hard evidence with numbers and charts. Then we broke up the information with a hands-on labeling activity and ended by giving the kids a delicious reminder to always remember, “ who they are!”

Giving Doll Program

Last September three students ventured into a project that has brought them to a realization that as teens, accomplishments can be made. Raina Wilson, Justin Luebke and Skylar Wuebker accepted the huge challenge of “The Giving Doll” program, which is all about giving aid to those in traumatic or disadvantaged situations. For three teens, this was a hard task, but also one worth doing. They wanted to help, but weren’t entirely sure how to really tackle their goal. Using a planning process, they addressed how to acquire funds (a shorts day donation from the students for their project needs) and with whom they might partner to accomplish the various tasks and needed skills, like sewing. They contacted a local embroidery shop that eventually donated the time and the cost of the faces of the dolls. In November some chapter parents helped with more necessary fabric donations along with skills of cutting and construction of the dolls and the clothing. In January another partnering to construct carrying bags and blankets took place. Purchased with their funds, voice boxes have been inserted into the soft bodies.

As the three teens complete their construction and the dolls develop character, they realize the hardest decision is to identify agencies that will give each doll ensemble its final home to a child in need. Selecting agencies for distribution to help complete their final task has been difficult. They have chosen the St. Marys Post of the Ohio Highway Patrol and the Women's Shelter of Auglaize County.

Achievement Testing

Achievement tests are designed to give school districts information about how well your child is progressing at a certain point in the school year. To that end, our achievement assessments are scheduled again this year for the following:

Grades 2 & 4 will complete the Stanford Achievement Test and Otis Lennon Test of Basic Skills the week of March 1. Grades 3 - 8 will complete the Ohio Achievement Assessments according to the following schedule:

April 20 - Reading Test- Grades 3,4,5,6,7,& 8

April 22 - Math Test- Grades 3,4,5,6,7,& 8

April 27 - Science Test- Grades 5 & 8

Sometimes just thinking about these tests makes students-and their parents- anxious and angry. Hating them won't make them go away. In fact, a bad attitude can actually hurt a student's performance. Instead of dread think ahead and use these test taking hints:

- Be well rested - A good night's sleep is very important.
- Eat a good breakfast - A nutritious and filling breakfast is a must.

- Concentrate on the test - Pay close attention to directions, don't rush, be careful of pencil markings.

Challenged to Do the Right Thing

Our seventh and eighth grade students have been challenged to live this years school motto of "Do the Right Thing." The eighth grade viewed the presentation "Rachel's Challenge," on February 5. ENGINEERING THE PERFECT PRINGLES POTATO CHIP

The 7th and 8th grade Science classes participated in the Pringles Potato Chip Challenge, a teacher sponsored event held to enhance science, technology, engineering, and math skills. The objective was for students to design and test a container, made of single-ply cardboard, for shipping a single Pringles potato chip, via the US Postal Service. Schools from California, South Dakota, Maine, Kentucky, and Florida were the destination schools students would exchange their packages with. The goal of the challenge was to engineer the package to have the smallest volume and smallest mass that will protect the chip so that it arrives at its destination undamaged. Students had to use one regular Pringle's potato chip, where no substance may be applied to the chip, or the chip altered in any way. The chip had to be edible when received by the evaluating school. Minster students received packages from other schools that were evaluated for chip intactness and the results were forwarded to the sponsor teacher of the event.

ACADEMIC BOOSTERS SPONSOR PROGRAMS

On Friday, February 26, the Academic Boosters organization sponsored COSI On Wheels "*It's Simply Chemistry*" at the Elementary School. Over the years, this has been a great educational event that the kids really enjoy.

Also, the Academic Boosters was one of the sponsors (along with FCCLA, FFA, and Student Council) for the Rachel's Challenge program at the Minster High School on Friday, February 5.

We are proud to provide these opportunities for our students.

ACADEMIC BOOSTERS FUND TEACHER GRANTS

The Minster Academic Boosters provide funds for teacher grants to supplement classroom materials. In this newsletter, we will highlight a few of the 18 teacher grants (totaling more than \$5,900!) that were awarded for the 2009-2010 school year.

Approximately 106 books were purchased by the Academic Boosters for use in Mrs. Rindler's 8th grade language arts classroom and the Middle School / High School library. These books are of various reading levels and genres that Mrs. Rindler uses for two *Battle of the Books* challenges during the academic year. The first is incorporated during an instructional unit based on the Holocaust. Mrs. Rindler said: "Students need to be exposed to a variety of literature so that they increase their reading and comprehension skills and also develop an appreciation for literature. In addition to their growth in these skills, I am encouraged to see the enthusiasm of students as they discuss what they are reading. This discussion promotes higher levels of thinking among those who have read the books, but it also inspires others to do the same. Students are seen with novels in their hands as they change classes and when they finish their work. Students ask daily if they will have 'extra time to read'. It is an exhilarating environment."

Students learn in many different ways, therefore, Mrs. Heitkamp requested a Listening Center for her 3rd grade classroom. "Auditory learners remember information more accurately when they have listened to it. They understand new ideas and concepts best when they hear the information. The listening center helps me accommodate each student's learning style." Mrs. Heitkamp continued: "At the listening station, students listen to stories on tape. I provide a variety of material for them to listen to: nonfiction books, music, poems, and stories. Sometimes they listen for entertainment and other times there is a set purpose for listening. The center also allows for students to record their own readings to which I or other students may listen. Using the listening center for reading assignments allows for greater reading success for the auditory learner."

Third grade teacher, Mrs. Wiss received a grant for Mountain Language and Mountain Math materials, along with two large pocket charts and an adjustable chart stand. Mrs. Wiss explained: "Both of these programs give students a chance to practice state standard skills. Mountain Language hits 20 of the most important language arts skills, such as capitalization, proper and common nouns, alphabetizing, and correcting sentences.
